Parish Council News

Welcome to the Winter edition of Utterby Voice and I trust that you have had a pleasant Christmas season.

The success in having speed restrictions on the A16 to 30 mph continue to seem effective and make some difference to the speed through the village.

The Parish Council has joined the Community Speed Watch Scheme and will soon be putting up passive speed limit reminder signs through the village. We will work with LCC to find Speed Watch sites in the village where volunteers will be able to record details of speeding vehicles using handheld speed detection devices. Full training will be given to everyone who wishes to be involved. Please contact the Parish Clerk (see back cover page) to register interest.

The gates to the public right of way on Church Lane have been replaced this week and the Parish Council has commissioned a new base around the Millennium bench on Church Lane, and so that will enhance both of those pleasant areas in the village.

We still await more news on the local government re-organisation of Greater Lincolnshire into two new unitary authorities which may see the eventual loss of our regular attendee at Council, Edward Mossop from East Lindsey District Council. Our County Councillor in Nick Hastings (Louth North).

We have a full complement of seven councillors and always welcome and encourage residents to attend our monthly council meetings to raise any concerns and initiate action - these meetings are noted both on the Village Hall notice board and on the web page.

We continue to donate annually and work closely with St. Andrews Church Council, the Village Hall Committee, and the Utterby Primary Academy to promote greater unity and

UTTERBY PUBLIC TELEPHONE

In early 2025, vigilant residents and members of Utterby Parish Council noticed an official notice displayed inside the public telephone box at the junction of Main Road and Grange Lane. The notice set out BT's intention to remove the landline telephone — and potentially the iconic red kiosk itself.

For a rural English village, a traditional red telephone box is more than a relic of the past. It remains a modest but meaningful anchor point: a dependable means of communication during power cuts or mobile signal blackspots, and a familiar landmark woven into the village's identity. Its bold red paint and unmistakable design lend character to the streetscape, offering a charm that modern infrastructure rarely provides. Keeping it operational preserves both practical utility and cultural heritage in a single, unmistakably British symbol.

BT's consultation period was set for 90 days, running from 29 January to 28 April 2025. Comments and objections were to be submitted to East Lindsey District Council. Although Utterby Parish Council could not formally object until the consultation period had concluded, it submitted informal comments of objection at the earliest opportunity and sought clarification from the local authority.

At the same time, the Parish Council explored alternative options to safeguard the kiosk, including participation in a nationwide kiosk adoption scheme. Members also researched Ofcom regulations governing the removal of public telephones. Their findings showed that BT could not remove the telephone if any of the following applied:

- ◆ the location lacked coverage from all four mobile network providers
- ◆ the area had a high incidence of accidents or emergencies
- ◆ the telephone had been used to make 52 or more calls in the previous 12 months

With the third criterion in mind, a small group of residents began using the telephone regularly, aiming to ensure that more than 52 calls were made before the consultation period ended.

Once the 90-day consultation had concluded and formal

representations were permitted, Utterby Parish Council submitted a detailed five-page objection letter to East Lindsey District Council, BT, and Ofcom. The letter set out clear reasons for retaining both the working public telephone and its kiosk, including poor mobile coverage in parts of the village, the kiosk's location on local school bus routes, and the need for a reliable public telephone during recent flooding incidents.

In July 2025, the Parish Council received confirmation from ELDC Planning that BT had decided not to remove the telephone box due to inadequate mobile coverage in the area.

This outcome serves as a reminder that the kiosk remains a “use it or lose it” community asset. Utterby Parish Council encourages residents to make regular use of the telephone — especially as all BT public telephones have been free to use since 2022 — whether it is a quick call whilst walking the dog to let loved ones know you're heading home, or a brief call to check in with a friend who's having a difficult week. The telephone and its kiosk are valued features of the village, and it is hoped they will continue to serve the community for many years to come.

IMPROVING ROAD SAFETY AROUND UTTERBY PRIMARY SCHOOL

Since 2021, parents, staff, and local residents had raised concerns about speeding motorists on the roads close to LIFT Utterby Primary Academy.

Drivers had increasingly been using Barton Street and Pear Tree Lane—both faster routes with 60mph and 30mph limits—to bypass the slower 50mph and 30mph roads leading to and through Ludborough. As a result, the roads near the school had become a cut-through, with some motorists failing to reduce their speed appropriately when passing the school.

The impact had also extended into Utterby village, where many drivers continued along Barton Street and onto Church Lane, adding to traffic and speed concerns within the village.

In August 2024, Utterby Parish Council received a letter from a local resident highlighting these concerns and requesting reduced speed limits and improved signage. In response, the Parish Council worked closely with the Headteacher and staff at LIFT Utterby Primary Academy to formally petition Lincolnshire County Council and the Lincolnshire Safer Roads Partnership for targeted safety measures around the school.

A major step forward came in March 2025, when senior managers from Lincolnshire County Council's Highways Team visited the site. Representatives from both the school and the Parish Council were able to outline their concerns directly, and the visiting team witnessed first-hand the inappropriate use of the surrounding roads

by both cars and commercial vehicles, with a noticeable volume of drivers using the route as a cut-through.

Although the County Council's initial response focused on smaller measures—such as resurfacing worn sections of road and refreshing junction markings—more visible improvements soon followed. In April 2025, new 30mph repeater signs were installed on all approaches to the school, supported by the agreed road-surface and junction upgrades. In May, road-painted speed roundels were added to reinforce the 30mph limit and increase driver awareness.

Monitoring began in July 2025, when the Lincolnshire Safer Roads Partnership, working alongside Lincolnshire Police, carried out an Archer Traffic Survey near the school. The survey measured traffic volume and speed over a seven-day period. Although the initial results did not automatically trigger a review of the existing speed limits, the Parish Council, the school, and locally elected representatives continued to press for further action.

This sustained engagement led to further progress in November 2025, when advisory 20mph signs were introduced on all approaches to the school for use during school hours. These signs offer an important reminder for drivers to reduce their speed when children and families are most active around the school.

Taken together, these measures have already strengthened safety for pupils, pedestrians, and motorists. Early observations show a clear reduction in traffic speeds close to the school, and the earlier issue of cut-through traffic no longer appears to be occurring to the same extent. As drivers become more familiar with the new signage and advisory limits, compliance is expected to improve further. In time, these improvements should help make the roads around the school and across the village feel calmer and more predictable, reducing near-misses and creating a safer, more comfortable environment for everyone who lives, walks, or drives in the area.



Village Hall News

The Village Hall Management Committee has continued to be busy with regular hires, renovation and improvement work to your Hall over the past six months.

WE HAVE BEEN SPENDING OUR ELIF GRANT

Our East Lindsey Investment Fund grant topped up by our match funding, has been well spent. We have carried out the following improvements and purchased the following resources

- Repointed areas to the South external wall
- Installed a block paved, accessible/Blue Badge parking space, and pathway to the door
- Sanded and varnished the main hall floor
- Purchased 60 new stacking chairs for the main hall
- Added motion sensor heaters to the toilets
- Hung four large photo canvases in the main hall and installed photo art panels in the toilets
- Carried out a full redecoration of the coffee area, kitchen and toilets
- Re-carpeted the coffee area
- Installed new sinks, lever taps, rails and locks in the accessible toilets
- Added to the baby changing facilities by creating a changing area in the male toilets
- Added new bathroom mirrors and urinal screens (donated by Utterby Community Coffee Morning)
- Provided new indoor noticeboard and book shelves (donated by Utterby Community Coffee Morning)
- Purchased leaflet display holders to hold promotional flyers and booklets
- Installed a new outdoor Hall name sign, accessible parking sign and multi language welcome sign plus new toilets and kitchen door signage.



All this work continues to ensure our Hall provides good quality, welcoming facilities for a wide variety of people and activities.

We would also like to thank KRN House & Garden Plants for donating several Peace Lillies to add a touch of greenery to our environment.

WE HAVE RECEIVED SOME ADDITIONAL FUNDING

Thanks to Lindsey Lodge Freemasons for their donation of £500 and Utterby Parish Council for a £500 grant. These funds are being used towards our current improvement works.



We will not include Ings Lane, Lincoln Gate or Pear Tree Lane.




Afterwards:

St Andrew's Church: At the Heart of Village Life

St Andrew's Church continues to thrive as a lively and welcoming hub for our village.

While our ambitious plans to re-order the church are taking longer than hoped — and the removal of the pews will not take place this spring — work continues steadily behind the scenes on design, permissions and funding.

In the meantime, the District Church Council and our dedicated volunteers have been incredibly active. The Remembrance Day poppy display was a moving highlight, thanks to the wonderful response from villagers who knitted poppies. Special thanks go to Dawn Marfleet and Pam Wood, who stitched the display together. We are delighted that it will return again this November.

The Poppy Rhodes Pumpkin Trail was another great success, with over a hundred people with children ending their walk at the church to enjoy hot dogs and burgers. Our Christingle service was equally memorable, with the church almost overflowing as families gathered and children proudly carried their oranges and candles — a joyful occasion we were thrilled to host.



Visitor numbers have continued to rise throughout 2025, with more people attending special services than ever before. Café Church is now a regular feature of our calendar, taking place three times a year. Other much-loved services include Songs of Praise in June, the Harvest Festival in September and Christingle at Christmas, offering something for everyone in today's community.

Alongside our regular Sunday services, we have introduced a 10.00am Holy Communion on the first Tuesday of each month, led by Mother Karen. This gentle half-hour service offers a precious moment of peace and reflection.

St Andrew's is your village church — a place for quiet contemplation, companionship and connection. No one should ever feel lonely or left out.

At 11.00am on the first Tuesday of March we will be holding a coffee hour, which will become a weekly event from April onwards. Do come along

for a cup of coffee and a chat with your neighbours. The children from the village school act as our enthusiastic waiters and waitresses — a role they thoroughly enjoy.

Looking ahead, we are excited about our 2026 programme. Primrose Sunday remains a popular annual event, attracting visitors from beyond the village. In May, flower arranger Claire Sutton will give a demonstration on creating a table decoration, and in July we look forward to a special Q&A with ultra-marathon runner and world record holder Imo Boddy.

In September, the church will be specially decorated for the Wolds and East Coast Open Churches Festival and English Heritage Open Days. During these events, we will be showcasing the church's heritage, including its historical connections with the Gilbertine monks of North Ormsby. These events attract visitors from far and wide.

Welcome to 2026 at Lift Utterby

It has been an incredibly busy and rewarding few months at the school. From festive celebrations and significant safety improvements to a creative start to the new year, our pupils continue to embody the community spirit that makes Lift Utterby so special.

A New Chapter: Lift Utterby


You may have noticed a significant change on our school signage. As part of a trust-wide rebrand, we are now officially Lift Utterby. While our trust is now known as Lift Schools, our commitment to nurturing and inspiring every child remains exactly the same. The new identity reflects our shared belief in raising aspirations and "lifting" opportunities for all.

To celebrate this transition, the children voted on a British wildlife theme for our new class names. We are proud to introduce the Owlets (EYFS), Owls (Years 1 & 2), Eagles (Years 3 & 4), and Falcons (Years 5 & 6). Each class now has its own mascot and logo, which made their festive debut at the Louth Christmas Tree Festival at St James' Church. Our "crack team" of decorators prepared an entry featuring handmade decorations from every child, and we owe a huge thanks to the Rotary Club of Louth for sponsoring the tree, and to parents George Sparkes and Hannah Filer for their rapid organisation.

Safety First: In the Community and at the Gates

The safety of our children remains our top priority, and we have seen major progress this winter:

School Safety Zone: You may have noticed the new 20mph signs around the school, which were recently upgraded to cover all directions and both sides of the road. This is a massive improvement for our families at drop-off and pick-up times. A huge thank you to Parish Councillor and parent Marc Traves for his tireless



support in making this a reality.

Staying Safe Sessions: In January, children from Utterby and North Thoresby joined together for workshops delivered by Lincolnshire County Council. Year 3 learned about in-car safety, Year 4 focused on risk-taking and community safety, and Year 5 explored how helmets provide vital protection in different situations.

A Festive Finale to 2025

We closed out the autumn term with a flurry of Christmas cheer and smashing performances: We enjoyed two incredible Christmas performances where every single child participated. The children spoke their lines with such clarity and confidence, showcasing the fantastic oracy skills we have been cultivating all year.

A Puppet Surprise - The Eagles and Owls snuck out on a surprise trip to Louth Methodist Church to see a retelling of the Christmas story. Paul Fox, our Chair of Academy Council, had everyone on their feet singing and dancing, and our older pupils even got a behind-the-scenes look at the puppets.

Radio Stars - If you tuned into BBC Radio Lincolnshire this December, you likely heard some familiar voices! After a visit from presenter Ross Carrick, our pupils recorded festive jingles and montages that were played throughout the month.

A Creative Start to the New Year

The classrooms have been hives of artistic activity this January:

The Owlets and Owls, our younger pupils have been investigating colour theory, successfully identifying primary and secondary colours and experimenting with mixing techniques. They have also been using various tools to create different textures in preparation for their upcoming collage masterpieces.

Meanwhile the Falcons have been undertaking Artist Studies. The Year 5 and 6 pupils have been analysing and interpreting famous works. They used a QR hunt quiz to recap their knowledge before studying Paula Rego. The class also explored John Singer Sargent, specifically his painting 'Gassed'. After thoughtful discussion, the children worked together to recreate the image, with each pupil interpreting a different section of the work.

Autumn Memories

Before the Christmas break, our pupils enjoyed several trips out and about

The Owlets and Owls visited the Donna Nook seal colony in November to see hundreds of pups—a "sight to behold" right on our doorstep. Earlier in the term, the Owls enjoyed a morning of storytelling at Louth Library, while our Falcons School Council representatives practiced their hospitality skills at the church Community Café.

Sporting Success - Our school was transformed into a



high-energy training ground for a visit from GB Parathlete Liz McTiernan. Liz led the whole school through an inclusive fitness circuit, with every child completing physical challenges alongside a world-class role model. Afterward, we gathered for an inspirational assembly where Liz shared her story of dedication and the importance of a "growth mindset" when overcoming obstacles.

Not only were our pupils inspired to lead active lives, but their efforts raised a massive £664.80 for new school sports equipment! Thank you for everyone's incredible generosity.

We also hosted a cracking Cross Country event with neighboring schools, one of several sporting events we have set up as part of our self-run local schools sports league.

Community Pride - From our winners at the Fotherby Horticulture Show to the election of our new Head Pupils, our children have been fantastic ambassadors for the school.

As we look ahead to the rest of the spring term, we thank you for your continued support during this exciting new chapter as Lift Utterby.

How the Parish Council Works

The Parish Clerk works for and with the Council to action its decisions. The main role of a Parish Councillor is to represent the views of all residents within the Parish, to listen to and understand the views and needs of residents and different groups in the community. The precept is the parish council's share of the council tax. The precept demand goes to the billing authority, East Lindsey District Council, which collects the tax for the Parish Council. The Parish Council may only undertake actions if it has a statutory power to do so and it must also fulfil certain obligations.
