At the time of writing there are at least ten dwellings for sale in Uttterby as well as a number of building plots waiting for buyers. In addition three houses have been sold very recently. We also need to take into account the fact that there are a number of rental properties available or already occupied. We all know just how stressful buying and selling a property or moving home can be. Hopefully everyone involved at the present time in this trying process quickly reaches a successful conclusion.

For several years the Parish Council has delivered a "Welcome Pack" to new residents. We are guite aware that the effectiveness of this pack is limited but its real value is to show newcomers just how much their arrival in Utterby means to everyone. We want them not only to live in the village but to take a part in what it has to offer. A major objective must be to encourage more people to become involved in the day to day activities of Utterby. St Andrew's Church, the Village Hall and the Parish Council all need additional help to maintain and hopefully develop what is already in place. These organisations do not run themselves. They are dependant on the hard work and commitment of volunteers, in many cases over many years. Without the support of these loval dedicated people these institutions will eventually cease to exist in their present forms. These organisations are the "heartbeat" of our village and need to be maintained. Most people move to rural locations to experience an alternative lifestyle. Most of us made the decision to live in Utterby because of its appeal and as a result we are able to enjoy its green belt location and all of its advantages. However the price of this privilege is the responsibility of making sure that this lifestyle is able to continue for others in the future These village institutions need your support and assistance otherwise they will surely perish and everyone of us will be the poorer when this happens. As the "Welcome Pack" states Utterby is a lovely place to live, long may it continue to be so.

The containers placed at the end of our four lanes have been replanted for the Spring (see front cover) with a yellow display of primulas, tete a tete, yellow primroses and an evergreen shrub. The geraniums have been removed and hopefully saved for another day, later in the year. No-one would claim that these planters produce an amazing or overwhelming display. However they have already been much enjoyed and commented upon by many of our villagers. The planters will hopefully add to the Spring display of daffodils, planted over several years by the Parish Council. These daffodils will soon be visible in many parts of Utterby.

Village Hall News!

At the time of writing Utterby Village Hall is in a "good place". Due to the hard work of the present committee over the past nine months there has been a great improvement in all aspects of the hall's situation. Financially the bank accounts have been revised and reorganised and this has meant that we are now in a position to make rational decisions about the hall's future. Because we now receive regular and accurate bank statements we can make decisions and plans which will benefit and hopefully secure the future of Utterby Village Hall. Electricity and Water meters are now read consistently every month which in turn produces accurate statements

Last May bookings were the immediate priority of the newly formed committee. Obviously without bookings the hall would cease to exist. We have been extremely grateful to groups who have consistently used the Village Hall over a long period of time. The Saturday Cafe, which raises funds for St Andrew's Church, The Rover Group and Philip Walker's weekly art sessions are examples of organisations that have been vitally important in their support. However, during recent months the finances have been boosted by wide variety of new users and the good news is that bookings for Utterby Village Hall are "on the up".

Another lucrative source of income has been the use of the hall as a Polling Station. Whilst most people are totally fed up with elections and referenda it is a fact that they do provide excellent income for us. However a once every five years experience is quite enough politics for most people.

A major reason for the healthy state of bookings has been the improvement in the appearance of the building. The toilets, the kitchen and the interior generally are now much improved and maintained to high standard. The main part of the hall has now been completely redecorated by Pat Doherty and Glenda Thorndycroft and looks impressive and is greatly improved. This will only enhance our chances of increased numbers of hirings which in turn will produce increased finances.

There is still a great deal of work to be done. For example the carpark is an area of concern and will require attention in the near future, and at the time of writing we are acquiring quotations for a new rear double door which needs to be replaced. As stated above Utterby Village Hall is in a "good place", however there are still worries to be addressed. The Committee requires more members as soon as possible. It is no longer an onerous task. It is no longer a commitment requiring a great deal of effort from volunteers. The hall is an important part of Utterby village life which needs to be preserved and supported. If you want to join the Committee make yourself known to an existing member.

Come on "give it a go" I assure you that your help will be really appreciated and also be of great service to our village at the same time.

Our Council continues to meet on the first Wednesday of each month. Once again may I take this opportunity to invite you to attend and contribute to the Public Forum section at the beginning of each meeting. Your comments and opinions would be most welcome especially if they instigate discussions and actions concerning matters previously unknown to us.

As the photographs illustrate Utterby has endured a really dreadful period of wet weather. However compared to other places in our area we appear to have got off relatively lightly. Certainly in my nine years of living here I have not witnessed guite so much standing water in most parts of the village. The flood at the junction of Grange Lane and the A16 was dreadful and I felt extremely sorry for the residents who had to keep going in the face of considerable difficulty for many days. Throughout the whole village the sheer volume of water appeared to completely overpower the drainage system. As a Parish Council we can certainly bring this problem to the attention of ELDC through our local representative Councillor Mossop, whom I'm sure will be extremely supportive.

Obviously most of the village drains appear to be blocked. I suspect that this has been caused by fallen leaves and soil. Church Lane is a good example of this. Undoubtedly it is one disadvantage of living in a rural environment where wonderful grass verges enhance the roadside. Grass has a wonderful ability to regenerate and hopefully with the approaching better weather they will soon be back to their very best. Also as bulbs begin to appear in all

areas of the village it will not be long before daffodils enrich our roadsides and wonderful displays of snowdrops are celebrated, especially in St Andrew's churchyard. The planters at the junction of our village lanes and the A16 are now due to be transformed with evergreen shrubs and daffodils. Your feedback about these planters has been overwhelmingly positive, which is reassuring, and this gives the Parish Council confidence to pursue similar initiatives.

The vandalised bus shelter, adjacent to Benson Court, should have been repaired by the time you are reading this issue. Hopefully such anti social behaviour will not occur again. It has caused considerable inconvenience, reflects negatively on the village and most important of all it has cost the village approximately £300. This is money that we would much prefer to be spending on other village projects. Hopefully it will be an isolated incident!

Utterby Primary Academy

Following our wonderful Christmas plays and Christingle Service at St Andrews, the Spring term has provided a busy start to 2020 for all the staff and students at Utterby Primary Academy. We always like to kick off a new term with one of our fabulous activity weeks and this new term was no different.

This time around has seen the Year 5s & 6s in Morpurgo Class exploring their coastal themed topic which has included looking at the art of the Japanese artist Katsushika Hokusai and his famous work 'The Great Wave off Kanagawa'. Children created their own versions in class before creating a giant version on the school playground using mops and buckets in place of paint and paint pots (much to the amusement of our school caretaker...). Going from macro to micro, the children then recreated another of Hokusai's pieces, in which he painted 2 birds on a grain of rice using only a mouse's whisker. Our version involved painting a tiny picture using only a single hair from a paintbrush onto a small pebble.

The Year 3 & 4s in Kipling Class meanwhile were learning all about the ancient Mayan culture of South America. They made their own masks out of papier mache, created a Mayan calendar modelled out of clay and explored the foods of the region, rustling up their own tortillas, bean salads and even a traditional spicy South American hot chocolate drink (which had mixed reviews to say the least...).

Finally, our youngest children in Donaldson Class went off on safari. After reading "Handa's Surprise" the children explored the animals and environment of Kenya, tasted a carnival of different tropical fruits and made masks and art work of their own, this time of

the Masai variety. All in all, a fantastic week of learning.

This term we are also focusing on one of our whole school value of "Being Big-Hearted". To that end we recently held a bring and buy sale to raise money for the animals affected by the Australian bushfires. A fabulous afternoon was had by all and thanks to the generosity of our children and families we raised over £250 – an incredible achievement!

Recently we had a visit from a member of the Hindu community. He spent the day with the children telling them all about his Hindu faith and many of the customs and celebrations a Hindu might be involved in.

We also we pleased to receive a donation of books from the Louth and District Lions, who kindly gave us a selection of books on the themes of plastic pollution in the oceans. A fantastic addition to our library..

John Barker Award

Congratulations! The following commendation was forwarded to Samantha Smith the co-ordinator of Lincolnshire Village Halls Week 2020. As a result Pat and Glenda have been awarded the John Barker Award for their outstanding work in Utterby. The award will be presented on January 23rd 2020 at the Stanhope Hall Horncastle.

Utterby Village Hall has struggled in recent years as a result of poor and inconsistent management. There were serious concerns that it would close due to a lack of support. even though bookings were quite positive. During this time Pat and Glenda, often in an unofficial role, supported the hall in a number of ways. They were available as key holders and for basic cleaning and maintenance work which helped the hall to always be well presented. However since April 2019, as members of a newly formed committee, they have excelled. Pat has cleared and tidied rubbish from a lengthy passage at the side of the hall. He has also undertaken major work at the back of the hall, clearing this area with the aid of a JCB and Skip and finally reseeding it. Together Pat and Glenda have repainted the kitchen and done other basic redecoration work. Pat has also replaced broken roof tiles and guttering. In the main hall they have removed wooden panelling and damp proofed and replastered the wall. Finally they have painted the hall and fixed new blinds. Almost all of this work has been financed by money raised by Pat and Glenda, every Saturday through the summer, from the sale of vegetables and plants, grown by them in their garden. A truly great effort by both of them for which Utterby should be extremely grateful.
